
### Growing Our Sisterhood

### 805 & 801 Property Status and Priority Report

Tuck pointing was completed at 805 fall 2016 and some temporary repairs have been made to the stucco at 801 in the ongoing quest to prevent further exterior water damage to both houses.

The water, high moisture levels and seepage up through the recently replaced floor in the basement at 805 have been continuously problematic. In an effort to locate the source of the problem, outside firms were brought in to use remote cameras to assess the condition of the drainage tiles. Collapsed footing/drainage tiles were discovered below the house mother's apartment outside the chapter room. This situation became a major priority for us to repair to prevent further damage.

"The Big Dig," the tile repair work at 805, commenced as soon as school was out for the summer. This involved removing the plants and much of the dirt from the front yard at 805.

The tile, 12 feet down was dug up and replaced with a newer type of material. While that area of the house's foundation was exposed, the outside wall was insulated and waterproofed. A camera was then used to check other exposed tiles to determine if any other areas needed repair.

In preparing for this repair, it was discovered Urbana's storm drain line the house gutters empty into, had also collapsed. The city will soon be repairing that. After the project is finished, much of the front yard will need to be restructured, giving us the opportunity to correct some of the slope issues currently present. The parent associations have agreed to help work on that project including once again relocating the plants from 801 back to 805.

We are going to have a parent work day on July 29th to work on the landscaping, if any of you want to come and meet and work with the current house girls' parents.

The east concrete patio at 805 has been slowly shifting and will be one of the next areas to replace before it does structural damage to the dining room or basement walls.

We are hoping to put the icing on the remodeling cake with new furniture and décor in entry way, living and alcove areas this year. Also in planning stages is new furniture and décor for the basement area.






